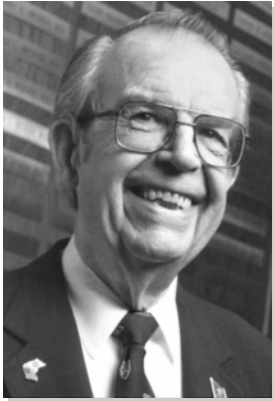

- Appointed by President Ronald Reagan as Assistant Secretary of Health, Department of Health and Human Services
- Recognized by many as the godfather of women's health, increasing the national awareness of women's health and health care
- Elected member of Institutes of Medicine and Fellowship in the American Association for the Advancement of Science
- Professor Emeritus, OU College of Public Health and College of Medicine, and avid Sooner fan

- Was a lifelong learner who was never limited by "the box" and believed success comes from persistence and hard work
- Was widely published, including book chapters, national presentations and prestigious scholarly journals
- Was a modest man, who didn't take himself too seriously and who valued personal integrity above all else
- Devoted to his faith, family, community and service

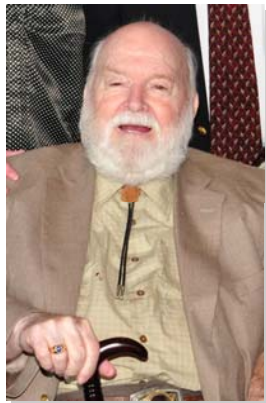
- Following the Scholarship Recognition Luncheon in August 2010, discussion was held at the COPH Advisory Board meeting about the growth of the college's scholarship opportunities, the impact scholarships have on students' lives and career development, and specific actions the Board might take to help further this priority.
- A suggestion was made that the Board establish a scholarship.
- Over the course of the next few months, several members offered to give dollar-for-dollar matches, and through the commitment and generosity of the group, \$58,507 was initially raised for the endowment.
- As additional gifts to the Fund increase the principal, the number of annual awards can expand.

- Assistant Professor, Department of Mathematics, OSU, including a year of study and research at University of Paris (Sorbonne)
- Professor, Department of Biostatistics & Epidemiology, OUHSC (1967)
- Traveled the globe, with sabbaticals at Universities of Dublin, Manchester, London, Stockholm, Athens, and Pahlavia (Iran)
- Retired from OUHSC in 1985
- Distinguished career with awards too numerous to mention

David J. Falcone, PhD (1944-1996)

- Earned BA and PhD from Duke University, and MA from Arizona State University
- Regarded nationally and internationally for his expertise in gerontology and long-term care
- Was faculty member, Duke University, while serving as Associate Editor, *Journal of Health, Policy, Politics & Law*
- Recruited to OU in 1992 as Chair and Professor, Health Administration and Policy, and Associate Director, Oklahoma Center on Aging
- Recognized as a role model who intellectually stimulated and inspired students, earning the OUHSC Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award (1996)
- Was major participant in RWJ Foundation grants on long-term care, as well as Oklahoma Rural Research and Demonstration Center

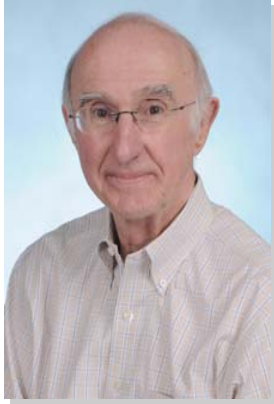

- First position in COPH was program admissions coordinator, handling recruitment, admissions, enrollment, and graduation
- Moved to administrative manager, overseeing Dean's office staff, college budget and first accreditation, ending her tenure as Assistant to the Dean
- Was recognized with Employee of the Month Award, International & African-American Student Association Award, COPH Alumni Association Service Award, and Regents Award for Superior Service
- Retired in 2005, she now pursues genealogy and enjoys grandchildren and nieces

James N. George, MD

- George Lynn Cross Professor, Department of Medicine (2005-present)
- Medical Degree from Ohio State University (1962); trained in internal medicine and hematology (1962-1970) at Vanderbilt University, Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, and University of Rochester
- Chief of OU Hematology-Oncology Section (1990-99) and Director of Hematology-Oncology Fellowship Program (1990-2002)
- Current focus: thrombocytopenia, describing the demographics, clinical course, and outcomes of patients with immune thrombocytopenia, drug-induced thrombocytopenia, and thrombotic thrombocytopenia purpura
- Active in American Society of Hematology (ASH); served as President (2005); Development Committee (2010-2013)

Brent Hurd (1973-2005)

- BA Economics, University of Rochester
- Member of Chi Phi Phi fraternity
- Hosted a popular campus radio show and was a great DJ with extensive knowledge of music
- Married his college sweetheart, Denise Brien, in 1998
- Was a natural athlete who loved to travel and hike
- Was working as a research assistant at the Oklahoma State Department of Health and in the final year of earning a master's degree in health administration when his life was cut short

CDRM Edmund Gleason (1915-1986)

- Through a GI bill, received OU's first public health degree (1949): BS Public Health & Sanitation, then in the College of Arts and Sciences
- First job following graduation was city-county sanitarian, Lawton, overseeing implementation of a state-of-the-art sanitary landfill which was subsequently used as a model for others
- Participated in The Passage to Freedom (1954), a Naval operation that evacuated over 1 million Vietnamese refugees from Haiphong south to Saigon. Received Vietnamese Presidential Unit Citation and Secretary of Navy Commendation for his efforts
- Had a distinguished military career in the U.S. Navy, with over 30 years of service

Robert W. Ketner, PhD (1925-1995)

- BA and PhD from OU; MSW from Colorado
- Served as psychiatric social worker in Topeka, faculty member in OU School of Social Work, and later in COPH's Health Promotion Sciences
- Was an inspired public health advocate in response to his own life experiences with polio and the stigma that surrounded it
- His strongest relationships outside of family were with his students and faculty colleagues
- Was instrumental in keeping the COPH from being closed by the legislature in the early '70s due to severe budgetary crisis
- Shared a strong bond with his twin William, his benefactor and lifelong supporter

Elisa T. Lee, PhD

- George Lynn Cross Research Professor in BSE, and former Dean, COPH (1994-2002)
- Founder and Director, Center for American Indian Health Research, devoted to research and training to improve health and reduce health disparities in the American Indian population
- Spent over 30 years focusing on research in Native American population, bringing more than \$45M in research funds to OU
- Has authored over 200 technical papers in a variety of prestigious journals, primarily focused on Indian health, particularly relating to diabetes, cardiovascular disease and eye disease
- Is a member of the National Advisory Council for Minority Health and Health Disparities and continues as a valued member of the COPH faculty

Dan J. Macer (1917-2001)

- MS Health Administration from Northwestern University
- Retired as Major, U.S. Army (1946) and awarded Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and Distinguished Unit Badge for exemplary acts while serving in WWII
- Held senior executive positions in Veterans Administration & U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and VAMC in Oklahoma City
- Served as Interim Dean, COPH (1980)
- President, Dan J. Macer Inc., consultant to health fields, professional associations, health planners, etc.
- Held leadership roles in various community organizations

The College of Public Health has made it a priority to increase the amount of financial support given to students through scholarships. In 2003-04, three scholarships were awarded totaling \$4,000. This academic year, 18 scholarships are awarded totaling \$42,000. Scholarships are established as endowed accounts with minimum balances of at least \$25,000. As these principal balances grow through the continued support of alumni and friends, the increase in earnings will allow the annual awards and/or number of awards to also increase.

Our goal is to get each scholarship's principal balance to a \$50,000 minimum, generating annual earnings of approximately \$2,500. This will allow the financial support to be awarded annually in perpetuity. And, with each award, the individuals for whom these are named will be remembered and their contributions and life celebrated.
